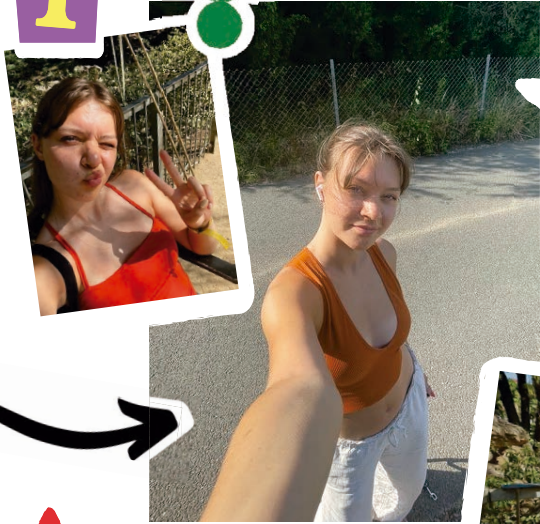


Who Am I?

In my free time I love reading books, especially fantasy novels. What I enjoy most about reading is how it lets you forget the world around you and discover a completely new one.



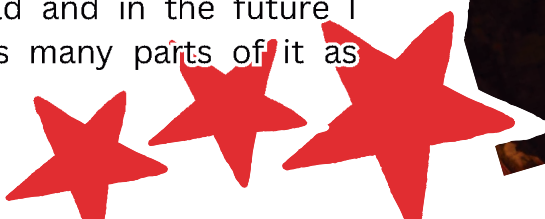

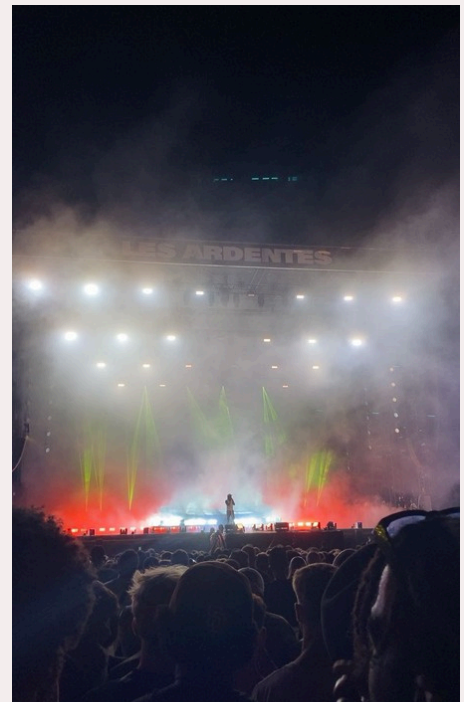
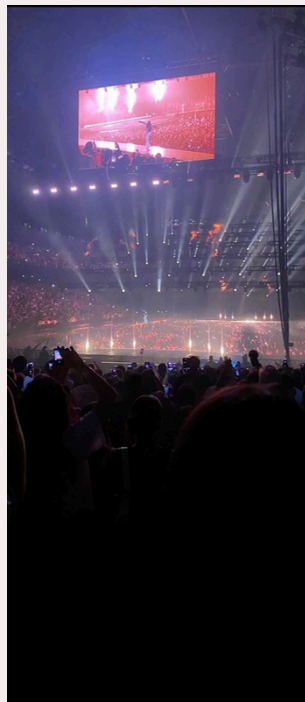


Interests

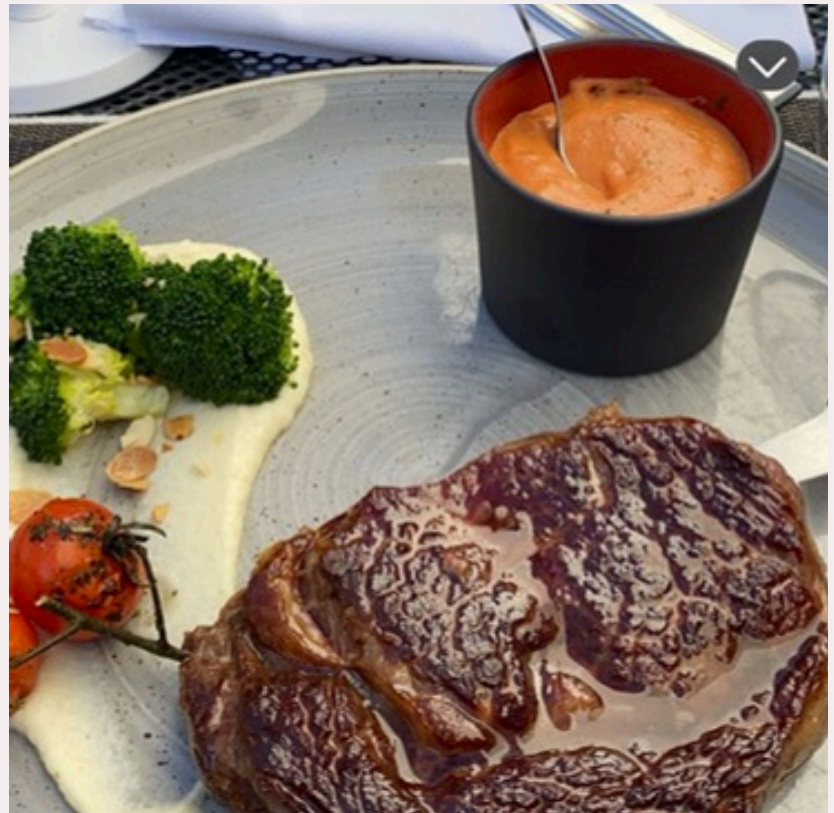


Food

Being alone for the first made me realise how much easier it is to make the meals at home and how much better they taste :(

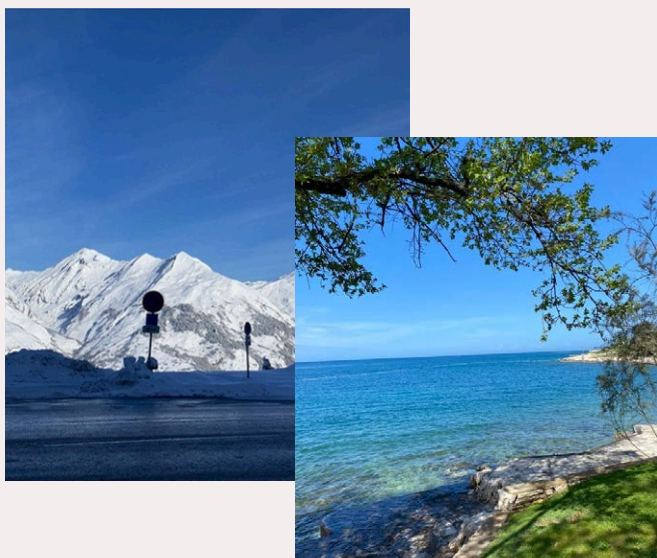
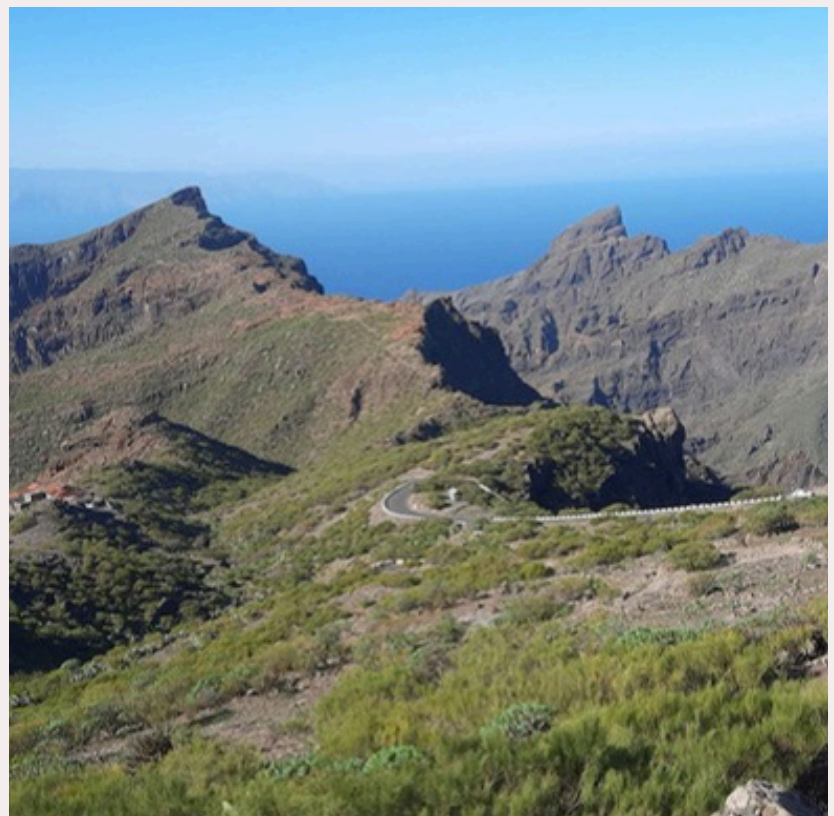


Holidays

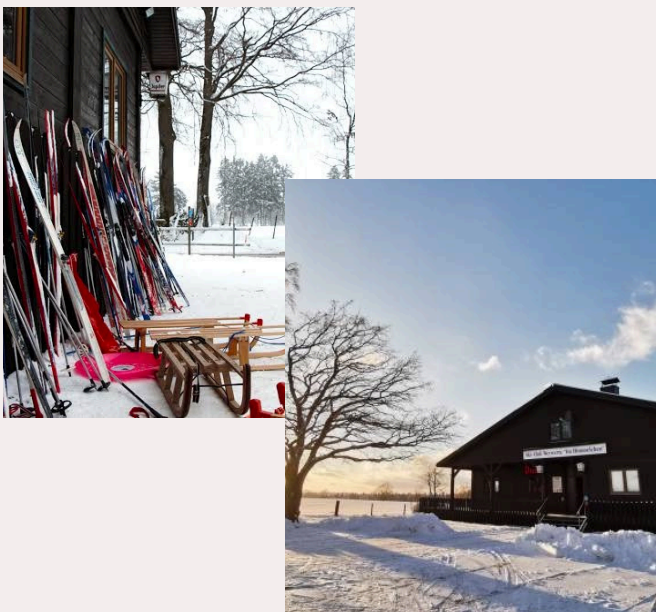

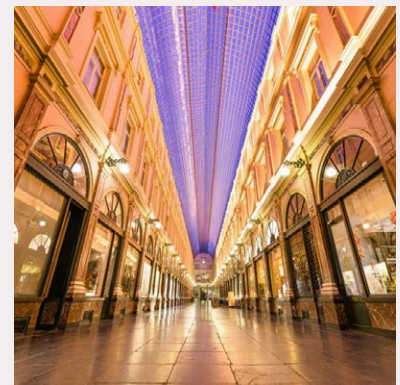

Let's Make a Circle, Erasmus+ Project Training Course

Why this project?

Have you ever thought about how much we throw away every day? Clothes, plastic bottles, food leftovers... Our world is based on a linear system: take → use → waste. But what if we could change that into a circle where nothing is wasted, and everything is reused?

That's the main idea behind "Let's Make a Circle", an Erasmus+ Training Course happening in Buzău, Romania, from 26 August to 4 September 2025. The project brings together young people from different countries to explore how circular economy can make our world greener, fairer, and more creative.

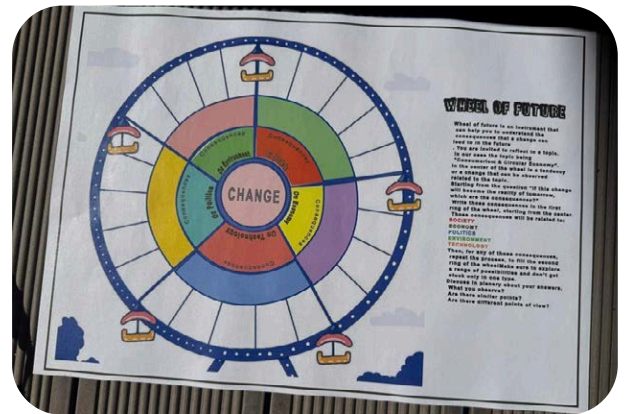
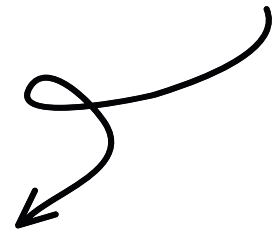
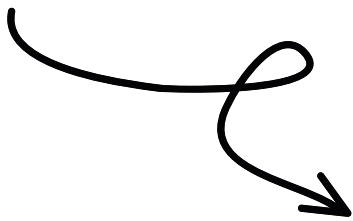


What did we do?

Instead of boring lectures, the project was designed as an interactive adventure. Each day focused on a new topic:

- From Linear to Circular : understanding the basics, sharing examples from our own countries.
- Fashion & Food : workshops on how what we eat and wear can be part of a circular system.
- Plastic & Consumerism : games and discussions about our habits and how we can change them.
- The Future Wheel : imagining how our world could look in 2050 if we live sustainably.
- We Rule : Let's Make Our Plan : teamwork sessions to create real action plans, campaigns, and creative solutions.

We also had lots of energizers, intercultural evenings, cultural visits (like the Buzău Geopark), and of course time to reflect, share, and have fun.



How did we learn?

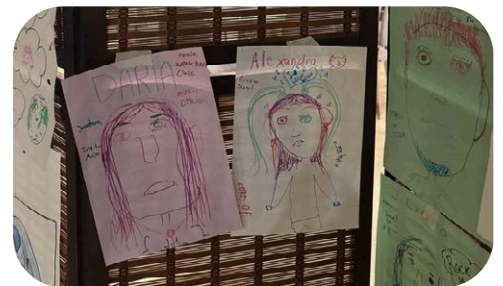
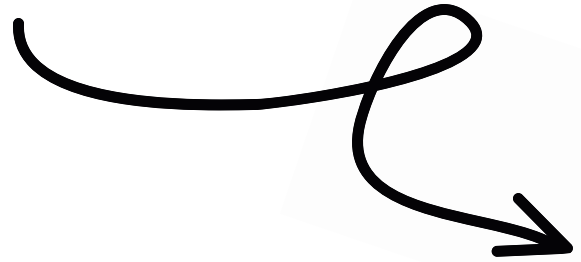
The project followed the non-formal learning approach:

- Learning by doing (games, role plays, storytelling).
- Sharing experiences with people from different cultures.
- Working in teams to design projects, posters, and campaigns.

Why does it matter?

This project shows that sustainability is not just about “big policies” , it’s something we can all do in our everyday lives. And when young people from different countries come together, they don’t just learn , they inspire each other to build a better future.

WHAT IS THE CIRCULAR ECONOMY?

The circular economy is based on the idea of extending a product's life and reusing resources again and again. Instead of simply "take, use, throw away", it follows the principle of "take, use, reuse, recycle."

Examples:

- Repairing a broken phone instead of throwing it away,
- Composting or sharing leftover food instead of wasting it.
- Selling or donating clothes you no longer wear instead of letting them sit in your closet.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

- Protects our planet:

Natural resources are limited, so we must use them wisely.

- Reduces waste:

Keeps landfills from overflowing and prevents pollution in the oceans.

- Invests in the future:

A sustainable lifestyle means a better world for future generations.

- Creates new job opportunities:

In areas like repair workshops, recycling centers, and second-hand platforms.

Circular Economy



RESOURCE RECOVERY

Electronic waste contains precious metals such as gold, silver, copper, platinum, cobalt and rare earth elements.

For example, about 300 grams of gold can be recovered from 1 ton of smartphones, which is much more than 1 ton of gold ore.

In 2022, the amount of e-waste generated worldwide was recorded at 62 million tons, with an economic value of over \$62 billion. If all e-waste were recycled, \$42 billion worth of raw materials could be recovered every year.



REUSE AND REPAIR

The circular economy is not only about recycling, but also about extending the life of products.

Old computers, phones and equipment can be refurbished and resold. In Europe, 15% of e-waste is reused in this way.

Economic and Employment Benefits

In Europe, the e-waste recycling sector in the circular economy employs more than 200,000 people.

STATISTICS OF WASTE

In 2022, out of about 2 billion tonnes treated:

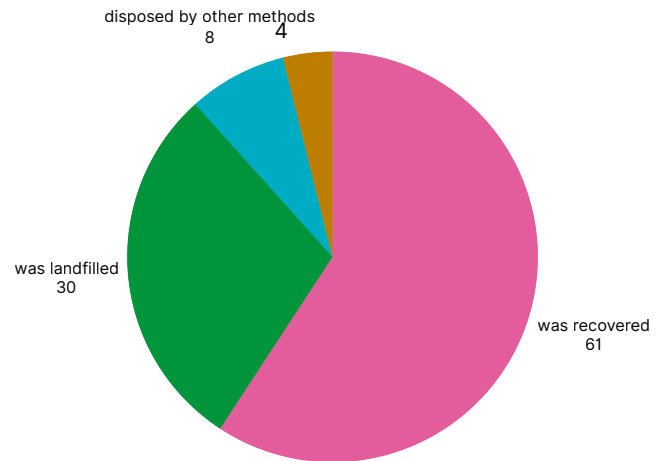
~61 % was recovered (recycling, energy from waste, backfilling).

~30 % was landfilled.

~0.4 % incinerated without energy recovery,

~8 % disposed by other methods.

While most waste is treated domestically (over 90 %), the EU still exports around 32-33 million tonnes yearly for recovery, especially ferrous metals and paper.



GLOBAL WASTE OVERVIEW

All waste types globally were estimated at ~20 billion tonnes in 2017, rising to ~46 billion tonnes by 2050 under current trends.

Municipal solid waste (MSW) alone is about 2-3 billion tonnes per year today, projected to reach nearly 3.5-3.8 billion tonnes by 2050.

Globally, only ~13.5 % is recycled, ~5.5 % composted—meaning roughly one-third to 40 % of MSW is dumped or openly burned, especially in low-income regions.

In high-income countries, only ~2 % of waste is dumped; in low-income countries, the figure is around 93 %.

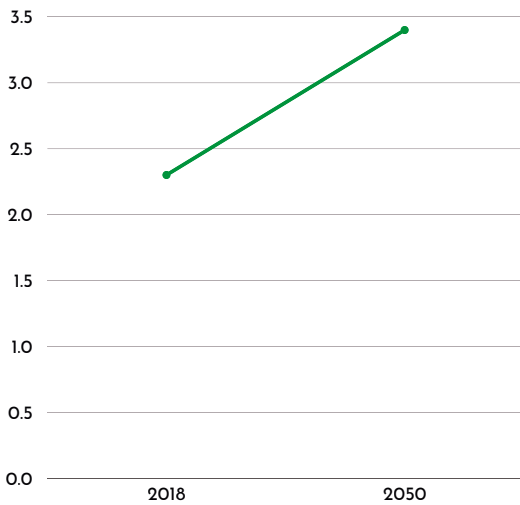
CLOTHING WASTE

Worldwide: About 92 million tonnes of textile waste are produced every year. 57% goes to landfills, 25% is incinerated, and only a small fraction is recycled.

EU: Around 7 million tonnes of textile waste yearly (~12 kg per person). Only 1% becomes new clothes.

USA: Produces ~17 million tonnes of textile waste per year; most ends up in landfills.

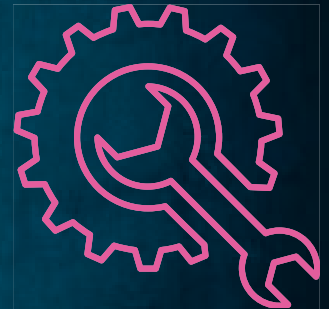
China: Discards ~26 million tonnes of clothing annually, mostly landfilled. 24



According to OECD data, 90% of the materials mined in the world turn into waste after being used only once, and according to the World Bank, the amount of global waste will reach 3.4 billion tons in 2050, up from 2.3 billion tons in 2018.

In the European Union, annual waste per capita is 530 kilograms, of which only 49% is recycled, while the global recycling rate is 13%.

In addition, 45% of greenhouse gas emissions come from the production and use of products. In addition to reducing these problems, the circular economy is of great economic value, with the potential to save €600 billion and create 700,000 new jobs by 2030, according to the European Commission.



WHAT IS THE EUROPEAN UNION DOING?

The European Union wants to build a circular and climate-neutral economy by 2050. To achieve that the EU has introduced in recent years many new measures to reduce waste and make products more sustainable.

These are some steps taken to support the circular economy:

- Banning single-use plastics,
- Introducing rules for electronics to be easier to repair,
- Promoting recyclable packaging,
- Setting standards for sustainable product design and production.



TIPS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

Everyone can contribute to the circular economy by building small daily habits:

1. Shop less, but better: Choose high-quality, long-lasting products instead of always chasing new trends.
2. Buy second-hand: It's affordable and eco-friendly.
3. Repair and upcycle: Learn simple fixes, and don't be afraid to transform old clothes.
4. Share: Books, items, clothes... they may be useful for someone else.
5. Reduce food waste: Take only what you can eat, and learn to make use of leftovers.

QUESTIONS WE CAN ASK OURSELVES

Do I really need this product?

Is it worth this price?

Will it lose its quality after a few uses?

Does it go well with other clothes in my wardrobe?

Can I use it for a long time?



Conclusion

The circular economy is a system where waste is minimized, products are reused and resources are kept in a continuous loop.

This approach not only increases economic efficiency but also contributes to social welfare by reducing environmental impacts.

Therefore, circular economy is one of the most fundamental transformation paths to be adopted for a sustainable future.
